

Tips on Obtaining U.S. Forest Service Letter(s) of Support

A letter(s) of support (LOS) from the District Ranger of each National Forest or Grassland District is often required with a proposal to the National Forest Foundation's funding programs. Tribal entities are encouraged to contact the NFF to discuss alternative options, such as a letter of partnership. Please refer to the program's specific request-for-proposals (RFP) for specific requirements.

How do I approach the Forest Service for a letter of support?

In all cases, reach out to the Forest Service as soon as possible to request a letter. It can sometimes take a long time to get the letter finalized.

- 1. If you have never been in contact with the Forest Service about your project or proposal, you will need to identify a Forest Service contact person relevant to the work you are proposing.
 - a. If you don't know the best person to talk with about your project, a good place to start is contacting the **Partnership Coordinator** or **Volunteer Coordinator** for your National Forest or Ranger District, or simply calling the **general information desk**.
 - b. If you know the person or position you need to connect with but don't have their contact information, you can use the Forest Service's Employee Search to find their phone number or email.
 - c. When reaching out, introduce your organization, state why you're reaching out, that it is for your application with the NFF, and your proposed project with timeline.
- 2. Once you have a project-related contact at the Forest Service, let that person know that a letter of support signed by the District Ranger will be required for your application. They can help draft a letter or may request that you provide them with draft content for the letter. They can then route the request to the District Ranger for signature. Letters signed by Deputy District Rangers will also be accepted.
- 3. Proposals that include activities in multiple districts on one National Forest System unit may choose to obtain a single letter of support from the Forest Supervisor rather than a letter from each District Ranger. Similarly, proposals that include activities on multiple National Forest System units within any Forest Service Region may choose to obtain a letter of support from the Regional Forester rather than each Forest Supervisor. Letters from Deputy Forest Supervisors or Deputy Regional Foresters will also be accepted.
- 4. It helps speed up the process if you can provide the written content to use in the drafting of the letter, such as a paragraph about your project and a paragraph about your organization. You

could also bring the template letter (see next page) to answer specifics about needed components.

How do I send the letter to the NFF?

Ideally, you receive your letter before the application deadline and can attach it to your online application. If your letter is not ready before the application deadline, you may email it to the NFF at this address: grants@nationalforests.org.

What should be included in the letter of support?
