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## **WELCOME & INTRODUCTIONS**

Karen DiBari opened the meeting and everyone said hello around the table. Seventeen San Gabriel Mountains Community Collaborative (SGMCC) members, one alternate, and two Forest Service representatives were present during the meeting.

## **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

The National Forest Foundation (NFF) is hosting the USFS Region 5 Capacity Building Workshop for California community-based and collaborative forest management groups in Sacramento on May 24, 2017. NFF will send invitations to the full Collaborative list. The registration link is [HERE](#).

Michelle Nuttall is a member of the USFS National Advisory Committee for the Implementation of the Planning Rule, and attended her first meeting. The Committee is charged with offering recommendations on public engagement and stakeholder collaboration, monitoring, communications to build understanding of the planning process, and best practices and lessons learned from early implementation of the 2012 Planning Rule.

## **FOREST SERVICE UPDATES**

Supervisor Jeffrey Vail provided an update on Angeles National Forest (ANF) and the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument:

- The ANF is continuing to work on the Monument Management Plan to ensure that the comments are properly addressed in the final document. The release maybe pushed back a few months to ensure a high quality final product.
- The ANF has obtained clearance from the Department of Agriculture to reorganize from

three units to two units. The ANF is working to match personnel with the two new districts: LA Gateway District (includes part of the LA River Ranger District and Santa Clara Mojave District) and the San Gabriel Monument District.

- The ANF is nearing completion of updating all telecommunications special use permits and plans. The ANF has around 1,100 special use permits so it takes some time to process them all.
- Coca Cola leadership and employees will be participating in a work day on April 21, 2017 at Chantry Flats. The ANF is looking for ways to partner with for additional organizations to address the needs of the forest.
- The Federal Lands Access Program, part of the Federal Highway Authority, is providing technical assistance to the ANF.
- Trails Planning Efforts are underway working with multiple groups including The Wilderness Society and other members of the Collaborative.
- The ANF has channeled money to the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) to develop a Trail Management Plan
- The ANF is working with the NFF and Washington Office on additional funding for recreation projects.
- The ANF has a detailer for the Trails Coordinator and will fill a permanent position once the detail is over and the hiring freeze is lifted.
- Currently under the hiring freeze, law enforcement and fire are exempt from that freeze; law enforcement has vacancies open that the ANF is working to fill.
- Supervisor Vail and the ANF staff will be meeting with Congressman Napolitano and Caltrans about Hwy 39.

### **FOREST SERVICE PROGRAM OF WORK**

Supervisor Vail explained the process and approach for the ANF Program of Work (POW) for FY 2017. He provided a list of the priority projects that they are working on, each of which has staff hours associated with them. This list includes projects that are in the idea stage (pre-National Environmental Policy Act, or NEPA), those that are currently being analyzed under NEPA, and those that are being implemented.

At the top of the list are the Admin, Supervisory, and Operations & Maintenance type work that all employees are working on. The Program of Work is a living document, meaning that projects and priorities can shift and move.

### **Questions and Additional Items about the Program of Work:**

- The ANF is working on closure orders for glass bottles.
- Volunteer-led projects are critical, but may not be on POW.
- Bill Reeves mentioned the work they have done to remove trash recently and microtrash is another huge problem for birds and wildlife.
- The ANF has transferred funding to NFWF to complete the environmental analysis for the Williamson Rock project, looking to engage stakeholders in the near future about this effort.
- San Gabriel Dam Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) Exemption is an effort from the City of Pasadena for a conduit exemption, meaning Pasadena would not have

to get a new license through the FERC process.

- The current Forest Service Volunteer Coordinator is Chris Fabbro.
- Supervisory Vail would prefer to focus on these priorities until they are done. If an item is on their program of work, the ANF is committed to taking it to completion.
- The question arose to the difference between the Schedule of Proposed Actions (SOPA) and the Program of Work (POW). The SOPA provides a process for the public to engage on actions that have already been identified as projects in the Program of Work.
- Many SGMCC members that were involved in the previous forest planning effort saw that many of the projects and goals were not achieved and thus are interested in making sure that the POW reflects the new Monument Plan.
- The group had a general discussion about how the SGMCC could engage with the ANF in out-year planning and prioritization.

**\*Consensus decision:** The SGMCC agreed to provide a process for the public to provide input into the POW by April 10. Supervisor Vail will provide feedback at the April meeting. This will be drafted by the Monument Plan and Transportation Coordinating Committee.

#### **Objection Process**

#### **Steering Committee absorbing the Communications Committee**

The Steering Committee has offered to take on the responsibilities of the Communications Committee. The Steering Committee will develop a process for Communications.

**\*Consensus decision:** The SGMCC approved the Steering Committee taking on the roles of the Communications Committee with the following conditions: 1) the Steering Committee ensure that current members of the Communications Committee are included in the discussions about communications issues; 2) a former member of the Communications Committee be added to the

Steering Committee; and 3) the Steering Committee develop a Communications Plan to handle general SGMCC communications.

**Membership**

The Steering Committee is not taking any action on membership until the SGMCC action plan is finalized. Therefore, the OHV membership is still open and pending.
